 - a. Health insurance for students Changes in the ealth insurance program for graduate students are coming in order to comply with the Affordable Care Act.Some questions that the university is grappling with include: 1) Are students employees or not? 2) How many hours per directly work? The current situation is theteryone is insured, and no one is going to jail, but costs are rising rapidlAt present, the university is offering a 'corridor plan," which provides coverage with a gap above a threshold. This is adequate for the next 18 months, but a different solution will have to be found after that. It was suggested (by some graduate students) that the universidivide the money available for insuran**pa**y it to the students and allow them to buy insurance on the exchange. However, that is illegal. Another suggestion has beendrease the pay rate to students an alrallow them to buy their own health in ance, but that is also not legal. Over the longer term, it is not clear what will happen many universities are struggling with this issue at the moment. Health insurance for graduate students will be looked at again in spring of 2016 for the fall of 2016. The situation is changing rapidly. At present, there is no option for undergraduates to purchase health insurance through the university at present. They have to be insured on place ntspolicies or purchase insurance on their own. At prets there is nothing for GAAC to do, but we may be asked to assist inipolstudents in the future

Outside examiners on graduate examsAt present, the graduate school asks for volunteers to serve assisted examineron Ph.D. comprehensive exams and defenses, bloey arenot getting enough facultayho volunteer to do it.
